Performance Evidence

Evidence of the ability to complete tasks outlined in elements and performance criteria of this unit in the context of the job role, and:

- perform the activities outlined in the performance criteria of this unit during a period of at least 200 hours of massage clinic work that involves:
 - 40 hours of massage consultations including assessment and treatment and incorporating the following treatment techniques:
 - compressions
 - effleurage
 - friction techniques
 - gliding strokes
 - petrissage
 - rocking
 - tapotement
 - 100 hours of massage consultations of one hour duration including assessment and treatment incorporating the following treatment techniques:
 - compressive techniques
 - deep pressure massage
 - friction techniques
 - lymphatic massage
 - muscle energy techniques
 - myofascial techniques without skin penetration
 - passive movement at joints
 - stretching techniques
 - thermotherapy
 - trigger point techniques without skin penetration
 - clients from different stages of life with varied presentations
 - monitoring and evaluating remedial massage treatments provided to at least three different clients with at least three treatments per client.

 - disrobing
 - modesty and privacy
 - table positioning
 - bolstering and comfort
- organisational protocols for preparation of treatment area:
 - equipment hygiene
 - table height
 - bolstering

- room temperature
- position of electrical cords
- lighting
- client privacy provisions
- preparation of self for providing treatment:
 - personal protective equipment (PPE)
 - hydration
 - personal hygiene
 - personal presentation:
 - hair
 - nails
 - jewellery
 - professional attire
 - footwear
- expectations of treatment and outcomes for different conditions and client groups, and factors that impact these:
 - client history
 - contraindications
 - client role in achieving outcomes
 - interactions with other treatments
 - client general health
 - health literacy of client
 - presenting condition
- · cautions and contraindications for treatment and possible indications for referral
- referral options for therapists:
 - allied health service and other health modalities
 - medical practitioner
 - support service
 - types and availability of further medical testing
- methods of monitoring treatment progress:
 - reassessment
 - client feedback
- processes for recommendations for continuation and variation of treatment:
 - communication with client
 - documenting on client record
- · sources of research and evidence that support massage practice
- requirements of reports and documentation prepared by massage therapists:
 - client record
 - assessment report
 - treatment plan

- insurance documentation
- statements of attendance
- professional development requirements for remedial massage therapists.

Assessment Conditions

Skills must be demonstrated in a simulated clinical environment that reflects workplace conditions set up for the purpose of skills assessment:

- the following aspects of performance evidence must be directly observed by the assessor:
 - 40 hours of relaxation massage consultations
 - 100 hours of remedial massage consultations
- remaining evidence may be collated during an additional 60 hours of clinical work.

Assessment must ensure access to:

- client information including case history and treatment plan
- treatment plan template
- private consultation area
- adjustable height massage table
- towels or sheets for draping
- oils and balms
- hot and cold packs
- bolsters
- hand washing or hand sanitising facilities
- modelling of industry operating conditions including provision of services to the general public
- on campus and in-person clinic supervision by a person who meets the assessor requirements outlined below for 40 hours of relaxation massage consultations and 100 hours of remedial massage consultations.

The massage consultations outlined in the performance evidence must be observed in a face-to-face environment by the assessor.

Assessors must satisfy the Standards for Registered Training Organisations' requirements for assessors, and

- have current clinical experience working as a remedial massage therapist, myotherapist or soft tissue therapist providing services to the general public; and
- hold current practising membership of a relevant Australian professional body that represents remedial massage therapists, myotherapists, or soft tissue therapists.
