Unit Descriptor

Unit descriptor

This unit covers the skills and knowledge required for machine sewing of leather or other materials associated with the repair of footwear or other items.

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Application of the Unit

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This unit applies to the sewing or patching of pieces of leather and other material. It covers the use of a basic sewing machine using straight stitching.

Work may be conducted in small to large scale enterprises and may involve individual and team activities. Work is performed within defined procedures under direct supervision.

The application of this unit is according to OHS practices of the enterprise and workplace practices, which may include:

- requirements prescribed by legislation, awards, agreements and conditions of employment
- standard operating procedures
- work instructions
- oral, written and visual communication
- quality practices, including responsibility for maintenance of own work quality and contribution to quality improvement of team or section output
- housekeeping
- tasks related to environmental protection, waste disposal, pollution control and recycling

This unit requires the application of skills associated with planning and organising for the safe and effective use of sewing machines in footwear repair and recognise and act upon problems with own work. This unit also requires an ability to communicate information to customers on repair requirements and costs and complete required job sheets. Self management skills are used to ensure work standards are achieved.

- read, interpret, and follow information on work specifications, standard operating procedures and work instructions, and other reference material
- maintain accurate records
- communicate within the workplace
- sequence operations
- meet specifications
- clarify and check task-related information
- carry out work according to OHS practices
