Release 1. Supersedes and is equivalent to MEM22014A Coordinate engineering-related manufacturing operations.

Application

This unit of competency defines the skills and knowledge required to coordinate and facilitate significant manufacturing operations where the coordination role involves application of engineering skills and knowledge to ensure safe, effective and efficient manufacturing. Operations may include specific engineering-related tasks, such as installation and commissioning of plant, design of equipment and major overhauls.

Where coordination skills for time-defined engineering projects are required, unit MEM22013 Coordinate engineering projects should be selected.

Where the planning, scheduling and purchasing is done in an engineering or manufacturing organisation following lean principles, appropriate competitive systems and practices units of competency should also be selected.

No licensing, legislative or certification requirements apply to this unit at the time of publication.

Relevant stakeholders include one or more of the following:	• team • organisation functional groups • support professionals and licensed technicians • customers and suppliers.
Records include one or more of the following:	• forecasts • schedules • budgets • records of operations, production quantities, quality and supply

	performance • process, resources and budget control measures • communications • graphics • specifications • tenders • contracts • personnel • resource allocations • financial management procedures • standard operating procedures, including maintenance procedures • records of procedures and legislative compliance.
Appropriate licensed technical and professional assistance includes:	• technical support and advice relating to elements which have intrinsic dangers including one or more of the following: • high pressure • energised fluid vessels • high temperatures and heat energy capacity • wiring or devices with high current or voltages above extra low voltage • professional support for engineering research, calculations and technologies • professional services for: • finance, accounts and tax • insurance and legal • training and human resources.
Continuous improvement procedures include one or more of the following techniques:	• balanced scorecard • current and future state mapping • measuring performance against benchmarks • process improvement, problem-solving and decision-making • data management, generation, recording, analysing, storing and use of software • training for improvement systems participation • technical training.
Constraints and contingencies include:	• financial, organisational, procedural or cultural constraints • physical constraints including limits to resources, site access or logistical limitations.
Software options include one or more of the following:	• enterprise resource planning (ERP) • system control data acquisition (SCADA) • spreadsheets.
Sustainability includes:	• meeting all regulatory requirements • conforming to all industry covenants, protocols and best practice

	guides • minimising ecological and environmental footprint of process, plant and product • maximising economic benefit of process plant and product to the organisation and the community • minimising the negative WHS impact on employees, community and customer.
